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IKEA Shopping tips

What has IKEA got in common with Marmite? Well, it's a shop you either love, or hate, I've concluded.

Regular readers and clients will be aware that I frequently recommend IKEA products for specific storage situations. My opinion is that most of their stuff is reasonably priced, looks good and has been thoughtfully designed to be functional.

So, what's not to like about IKEA? Some people (including my husband), object to the fact that one's route around the shop is planned by the store and it is practically impossible to deviate from their chosen path! This *could* also be viewed as a benefit, as it does encourage you to look at things you might not have considered, and this might be how you find just what you need.



Don't get caught out by price!

'IKEA Family' is a loyalty card with a variety of benefits. Sign up for free, either on line or in store.

Members qualify for special offers on some items, which is great. But if you don't know about this you might think you've got a good deal - until you get to the till!

Prices displayed on 'IKEA Family' special offers display the *discounted* price in large print.

Yes, you've guessed it, the *full* price is in relatively small print and looks quite insignificant.

So, if you don't want to be an IKEA Family member, watch out for this! Otherwise you might end up paying more than you'd bargained for.



Some more IKEA Family benefits:

- Special offers/discounts, some quite substantial
- Free coffee (Mon-Fri) plus discounts in restaurant
- 5% off assembly service
- Free product insurance covers home journey and self-assembly
- Events, workshops, etc

The shopping process:


If you're intending to visit your local store, I would suggest you check the IKEA website for opening hours, as there can be variations. Most importantly, to my knowledge, none of the shops is open before 10am Monday to Saturday and 11am on Sunday.

If you arrive a wee bit early though, you can claim a free coffee or tea in the restaurant which is open from about 9.30am. This is not related to the IKEA Family offer and applies to anyone.



Some furniture is available from the self-pick area on the ground floor. You need to carefully check measurements of your chosen items to make sure that, (1) you can fit them in your vehicle, and (2), you can manage them on your own. It's a good idea to take a friend!

Other items will be picked for you and sent to the collection area. You will be given paperwork to take to the till and having paid, you can then visit the collection area.



Be aware, this can be a time consuming process. When I recently visited a local store on a weekday, the shop was not busy, but there were long queues at the tills. Frustrating to say the least. I'm told this can also be the case at the collection points.

So, either factor in plenty of time, or make your purchases on the internet. Use your visit to the store to check on items you might buy. It's always good to be able to see and touch things, match colours and so on, before committing yourself.
