This month's topic has been prompted by enquiries from two ladies reference the best way to store certain types of clothes. This is not as obvious as it might seem!

Firstly - some people have items they hardly ever wear, taking up valuable space in their wardrobes.

The automatic "de-clutter" response might be - if you don't wear it from one year to the next, then sell it, or take it to a charity shop. Sometimes this is what you need to do. On the other hand, what if you've kept your wedding dress, or you have a full length ball gown that comes out once in a blue moon? These items are either sentimental, or just plain expensive, so the normal rules don't really apply.



I've spent some time researching the possibilities and have listed some options below. The requirements are two-fold, one to maximise storage space, the other to protect the garment concerned from dust, moths and other environmental damage. Quite a tall order.

Check out <u>www.memories-nostalgia.com</u>. This website specialises in storage for anything from precious family photographs to wedding dresses. Their boxes are acid free which is important for long term storage of delicate items. This is explained in much more detail on the website.

The aptly named, <u>www.weddingchaos.co.uk</u> offers similar advice and recommends various solutions.

Those of you with ball gowns need something more accessible which still protects your investment!



Having trawled the Internet, it would seem that dress and suit covers are readily available. However, assuming your dress only gets worn once or twice a year, it is important to store it in a breathable cover, otherwise there is a risk of mould growth or mildew. Equally, acid free material ensures that your precious dress remains as beautiful as the day you bought it.



One company offering such covers at very reasonable cost is <u>Hangerworld Limited</u>. These covers are available in a variety of colours and there is one large enough to suit a wedding dress, *provided* you have enough wardrobe capacity.

The **second** enquiry concerned the storage of shoes. The lady who posed the question confessed to having hers in a large heap at the bottom of her wardrobe. Not particularly good for keeping the shoes in good condition, and pretty challenging when pairs get separated. It really does save time if your shoes are stored tidily and in pairs.

Why make getting ready in the morning any more stressful than it needs to be?

Well, it's 'Really Useful Boxes' to the rescue once again! Their 8L open fronted box is sized to take one pair of ladies shoes.

I particularly like this design, as the drop down front enables you to access shoes from the bottom of a stack of boxes without causing an avalanche. Ideal for those ladies with, shall we say, a *penchant* for shoes.

The ones I currently have in stock are very pale pink but semi-transparent, so you can see which shoes are in which box.
