

Donate your Old Spec's!

If like me you wear glasses, the chances are you've a few old pairs somewhere cluttering up a drawer. Don't just throw them out. "300 million people in the developing world need spectacles to live a normal life" (Quote from the Vision Aid Overseas website).

Vision Aid Overseas collects spectacles for their work in the developing world. Opticians' practices throughout the UK support them by collecting unwanted spectacles.



The Vision Aide website, www.vao.org.uk/spectacles/ provides details of your nearest collection point. You can recycle your spectacles (not the cases) at thousands of practices throughout the UK, including many Vision Express practices and Kodak Lens Vision Centres. Details of your nearest store can be found on the website. Rotary International also donate to Vision Aide and Compleat Office Initiatives in Daventry are acting as a collection point on behalf of Rotary.

and Mobile Phones!

Often the old phones just lurk at the back of cupboards taking up space as people (quite rightly) are loath to throw them out.



There are many charities which will recycle your old mobile. The one I deal with is the RNIB (who also take old inkjet cartridges).

Visit their website www.rnib.org.uk/recycle or ring them on 0800 980 5375 for more information on how to help the two million people in the UK who have sight problems. If you register online you will be issued with a Freepost bag for your phone(s).

Not to Mention Old Jewellery!

Send unwanted jewellery to Marie Curie Cancer Care. They're happy to receive odd earrings, broken chains, stopped watches, whether it be costume jewellery or the real thing!

Donations are processed by a professional recycling company and all the jewellery is sorted by hand. Valuable pieces are sold, damaged items are broken up or melted down and the residue is sold to a specialist scrap merchant.
